Since word spread that Clare loved and cared for these 'wobblys – as her kids at school call them', we now have three: two Agile wobblys and an Antilopine Wallaroo, running around the house. Once reared, Clare will release them to a sanctuary near Darwin-if she can part with them?



Yirrkala, the community we live in, has seen a fantastic year. We have witnessed several baptisms, including this yappa (sister) and several young men; which is the result of several MAF men's discipling efforts and a men's camp amongst other efforts.

This year has been about helping and enabling other evangelists reach out to the Yolnu people of East Arnhem Land, as well as our own programs.
